The Nantwich group was launched in 2017 and has 50 active riders and a substantial waiting list. The total annual running costs of £28,500 are met through fund raising, donations and legacies.

Investment into advanced technologies

Reaseheath College and University Centre (UCR) has invested over £100 million into specialist teaching resources and facilities in recent years as we continually enhance our student experience to ensure we remain at the forefront of sector developments.

In accordance with our Leading Edge agenda, much of this investment has involved integrating further state-of-the-art precision technologies across our curriculum areas, ensuring that our students leave us with the technical skills and academic understanding that employers require.

In the current academic year we procured over £3m of specialist equipment, made possible by government funding to support higher level skills and the T Level courses we offer in Agriculture, Business, Construction, Forestry and Arboriculture, Food Science, Agricultural Engineering, Equine and Animal Management.

Construction has additionally benefitted from funding from the Advanced Construction Training project, a Cheshire and Warrington Local Enterprise Partnership initiative to develop digital technologies and skills regionally.

These outstanding resources meet the needs of qualifications both now and into the future. As a result we are becoming recognised for applied research and innovation and are developing local, national and international partnerships with businesses within the academic and industry sectors we serve.

Sustainability

Carbon footprint cut

A public sector grant of over £533,000, which Reaseheath match funded, has enabled us to take the first major steps to decarbonise our entire estate.

A project to upgrade air and water heating systems in our recently modernised visitor reception and in lecture theatres and classrooms within our university centre has already made a significant impact on our annual carbon reporting.

Crucially, the improvement has advanced our strategy of removing outdated, carbon heavy, heating systems and replacing with heat pumps where possible. Two oil fired boilers have been replaced with air source pumps and increased radiant panels, and air handling units and water heaters have been upgraded, potentially saving 80 tonnes of carbon annually.



PhD student begins research

The first PhD student to carry out a research project within the recently launched Institute of Sustainability and Food Innovation (IoSFI) has taken up her role.

Ella Robbins is conducting original research on whether treating water with stabilised hydrogen peroxide improves water quality, and whether the use of treated water for irrigation could improve crop performance. This approach is thought to have much potential but its use is limited by a lack of robust data and scientific understanding.

Hopefully Ella's research will lead to greater and better quality crop yields and less food waste, and her data will result in a published thesis. IoSFI is an academic collaboration between University Centre Reaseheath and the University of Chester.





Upgrade advances crop growing research

Lighting and heating systems in our vertical farm have been upgraded with the latest climate control software, enabling us to improve fertigation and advance our research into sustainable crop growing.

Fertigation is the technique of supplying dissolved fertiliser to crops through an irrigation system. The ratio of nutrients to water can be manipulated and managed to obtain the maximum yield. Although it's too early to measure the results scientifically, indications are that our herbs and salads are maturing more quickly, and with more flavour.

Crops are also grown soil free in our industry standard glasshouse, which has automated watering, feeding and heating systems. Zero-mile produce such as strawberries, tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines and chillies are served in our restaurants, while the vegetable waste feeds our zoo animals.

UCR Graduation

Celebrations for the Class of 2023

Nearly 200 graduates who completed degrees at University Centre Reaseheath (UCR) joined peers from the University of Chester, our strategic alliance partner, for a spectacular graduation ceremony held in Chester's historic cathedral.

The graduates were awarded degrees in agricultural science, animal management, canine clinical behaviour, equine science, zoo management, wildlife conservation and ecology, adventure sports and coaching and rural events management. They were joined by our inaugural cohort of veterinary nurses, who were awarded their BSc (Hons) in Veterinary Nursing after completing a new four year degree which is accredited by the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.



Professor Eunice Simmons, Vice-Chancellor and Principal of the University of Chester, told our graduates that their degrees would benefit the wider community and that they were now equipped with the skills and knowledge to develop the industries around regenerative farming, conservation of animal species, food security and sustainability, veterinary nursing and rural businesses.

It is offered solely through UCR and aims to produce world-class employees through practical and academic study.

UCR actively supports higher level learning which enables those already in employment to progress their careers. Eden undergraduates travel from throughout the UK to study for a Foundation Degree in Dairy Technology on a block release basis at our industry standard Food Centre.

Meredydd David Award for Academic and Technical Excellence

Born and raised in Athens, Kalliopi moved to England in 2020 to study for her degree. She chose UCR because of its excellent practical facilities and completed her second year work placement at our mini zoo.

As well as being an outstanding undergraduate, Kalliopi was Vice President of our Student Association for two years and became involved in all student activities.

The husbandry skills and theoretical knowledge she gained during her studies paid off, as shortly after completing her degree she was offered a position as mammal keeper at Attica Zoological Park in Athens. She is currently working in the savannah area, caring for red pandas and giraffes, and also within the native animal collection which includes bears and wolves.

Tomos completed his Foundation Degree in Animal Management (Behaviour and Welfare) with us in 2022 and followed this with a BSc top-up year.

Successful graduates qualify for their highly respected Registered Veterinary Nurse status without the need for further training and can confidently move forward within their profession.

The programme has been developed and delivered by UCR's specialist veterinary teaching team and includes a substantial clinical placement along with practical study in modern laboratories and dedicated clinical skills suites in our new Veterinary Nursing Centre, which is also home to our veterinary nursing apprentices.



UCR landscape architect scores hat-trick

BSc (Hons) Landscape Architecture alumnus Nathan Webster took three top awards for his 'Off the Grid' show garden at the RHS Flower Show Tatton Park.

Nathan, who studied on our Level 3 Extended Diploma in Horticulture before progressing onto his degree, was awarded Best Young Designer Garden and Best Construction, Young Designer Garden, plus a gold medal, in the prestigious RHS Young Designer of the Year category. His woodland design, built by Wright Landscapes, for whom he works as lead landscape architect, embraced sustainable living and reflected his passion for the outdoors.

Nathan furthered his elite show experience by helping to build a gold medal winning show garden at this year's RHS Chelsea Flower Show. The Ecotherapy garden, designed by Tom Bannister and built by Wright Landscapes, was judged best balcony garden.

UCR florists buzzing after award

UCR florists were runners up in a competition at the prestigious Interflora World Cup, a prominent international event being held in the UK for the first time since its inception in 1972.

As well as competing, the undergraduates were privileged to watch and learn from elite florists from around the globe.





Undergraduate's show garden champions 'grow your own'

Aspiring garden designer Harry Dean will celebrate his community allotment's 100th birthday in his debut show garden at RHS Flower Show Tatton Park 2024.

Harry, who is studying for a BSc (Hons) in Landscape Architecture at UCR, will lead a team of fellow vegetable growers from Over Allotments in Winsford on the garden build. 'A Gourd Time' will offer design ideas using produce grown by plot holders and will hopefully inspire show visitors to grow their own vegetables or even to become allotment holders.

The idea for Harry's garden stems from a historical event in 1990, when a pumpkin grown by a former allotmenteer weighed in at a massive 579 lb (262.6 kilograms), briefly holding the British heaviest pumpkin record!

The students' creations included an intricate screen, a floating design in front of a mirror, two corner columns, a fireplace garland and a cascade for the piano, in colours reflecting the room's décor. The floral designs were much



admired by the public and the project was an excellent addition to the students' CVs.

Animal science undergraduates present at BCUR

Four UCR animal science undergraduates presented their final dissertations at the British Conference of Undergraduate Research (BCUR), held at the London School of Economics and Political Science.

Grace Gouldin (BSc (Hons) Veterinary Nursing), discussed whether anxiety impacted the pain scale in canines during spaying, while Sam Sheriff (BSc (Hons) Zoo Management) described how the group composition of Western lowland gorillas affected enclosure use in UK collections.

Rys Howells, (BSc (Hons) Animal Management) presented their poster 'Do happy mealworms make happy meals?' which analysed fat content as an indicator of stress in captive mealworms, while Sydney Smith (BSc (Hons) Zoo Management), presented a poster evaluating a children's education programme at Knowsley Safari Park. Our delegates also listened to key speakers and mixed with international peers.

Motor vehicle students demonstrate industry skills

The Cheshire Skills Automotive Competition tested the practical skills and knowledge of teams from Reaseheath, Warrington & Vale Royal College, Macclesfield College and Cheshire College South & West.

The contestants, who were apprentices or IMI Diploma in Light Vehicle Maintenance and Repair students, had to remove and replace a cylinder head gasket and were quizzed by a panel of professionals.

They were judged on their use of technical data and tools and equipment, their awareness of health and safety and on the quality of their work. Warrington and Vale Royal narrowly won the contest, while the other teams were equal runners-up.





Business students win festival challenge

Reaseheath business students won an inter college competition designed to test their skills in an industry setting.

The Cheshire & Warrington Business Skills Competition is a collaboration between Reaseheath, Warrington & Vale Royal College, Macclesfield College and Cheshire College South & West.

Teams of aspiring entrepreneurs from each college were challenged to develop innovative solutions for a common festival problem - the mountains of abandoned gear left behind. The students had to create a business plan addressing the environmental and financial issues and pitch their ideas 'Dragons' Den' style to judges.

To ensure a supply of skilled and qualified rail engineering technicians, the company collaborates with Reaseheath to create a high quality and continuously evolving apprenticeship programme.

Over 40 apprentices from sites throughout the North West, the Midlands and London are on a three year block release programme based at Reaseheath's Engineering Apprenticeship Academy. Judges felt the apprenticeship provided a well rounded learning experience including mentorship, professional development and a clear career path, and noted the company embraced diversity.

Industry Excellence

Employer's business boosted by £millions

A degree level apprentice whose research project could potentially enable his employer to generate £5m in additional revenue received a special award on graduating from University Centre Reaseheath.

Aaron Morgan, who completed a Foundation Degree in Dairy Technology while studying on our industry focused Eden programme, was presented with the Meredydd David Award for Academic and Technical Excellence.

The Technical Manager at Dairy Partners (Cymru Wales), Aaron's project determined the practicality and potential benefits of installing a new bulk clean-in-place (CIP) system at his company's mozzarella factory in South Wales. CIP is an automated method of cleaning interior surfaces of equipment without dismantling, commonly used in the food and beverage industry.

Aaron's findings led to the installation of a new CIP system which has reduced cleaning downtime and significantly increased productivity.





Sixth industry accolade for Food Centre

Reaseheath's outstanding Food Processing Halls team has achieved the highest standards of Food Safety and Hygiene within a food production facility for the sixth consecutive year.

The team was awarded the prestigious AA standard following a rigorous audit against the latest Brand Recognition Compliance Global Standard (BRCGS) Issue 9. This is the highest possible benchmark for best practice in food manufacture and proof that our Food Centre operates under highly controlled conditions and at the highest industry standards, further evidencing the industry focused, career ready nature of our work.

This was our first audit against Issue 9 of the standard, which included changes to the food safety culture plan, food defence and further allergen controls.

T Level held up as benchmark

Reaseheath's successful delivery of T Level in Onsite Construction was held up as a benchmark for others to follow at an industry-led information and networking event hosted on campus.

The Construction Industry Training Board event, supported by the Department for Education and the Gatsby Foundation, brought together curriculum leaders from 12 UK education providers who are delivering or planning to deliver the T Level in Onsite Construction.



The delegates discussed how the T Level can be developed and supported to meet the needs of both students and the construction industry, with Reaseheath's curriculum offer being held up as a model of best practice, particularly in its 100% retention of students and its strong industry partnerships.



NFU Vice President quizzed

Agriculture students took the opportunity to quiz National Farmers' Union (NFU) Vice President Rachel Hallos during a campus visit.

Rachel, whose specialities include education, workforce skills and science, research and development, came to Reaseheath to gain a greater understanding of the skills training we offer, in particular in the areas of food, farming and environmental protection.

After touring our vertical farm, glasshouses, automated robotic milking system and industry standard Food Centre, she paused briefly at a soil science masterclass before joining students for a Q and A session.

Subjects discussed included the importance of agricultural businesses adapting to meet the changing demands of the consumer, and the increasing emphasis on the use of data and science within farming and food production.

Partnership enhances career prospects

Our partnership with sports coaching and education company NAR Kollective is enhancing the training and learning of sports students as they prepare for entry into industry.

The company, which is owned, run and staffed by experienced sports professionals, is supporting our sports programmes through high level coaching and also by providing access to a well rounded experience within the sports sector.

Students on our Level 3 National Extended Diploma in Sports Coaching and Development are enjoying weekly football coaching sessions from NAR athletes, while BSc (Hons) in Football Coaching undergraduates are developing their working knowledge alongside the coaches.

There are also plans to widen the range of sports in the curriculum, enabling students to gain a wider overview of the sporting industry.



BHS coaching conference hosted

Professionals looking to elevate their British Horse Society (BHS) accredited qualifications attended the British Horse Society Jump Coaching Conference, staged at our Equestrian Centre.



Thanks to our strong partnership with the BHS, Reaseheath was one of only two venues in the UK selected to host the event, giving our staff and students a fantastic platform to demonstrate the high quality coaching and training facilities that we offer.

Industry stalwarts Carole Broad FBHS and Danny Anholt FBHS led the conference, while our own BHS qualified instructors Georgina Dickinson, Katie Hancox, Tyler Simpson and Fiona Saxby showcased the excellent coaching offered at Reaseheath, assisted by talented student riders.

The event was very informative and we received outstanding feedback from attendees.

Reaseheath's Mini Zoo, which is one of the best at any educational institution in the country, was also open. Visitors enjoyed viewing our extensive animal collection which includes meerkats, lemurs, otters, birds of prey, companion animals, reptiles, amphibians and fish. Activities included educational talks by zoo keepers, and in particular the chance to learn more about our resident Ouessant sheep, a rare French heritage breed renowned for being the world's smallest sheep breed.

Litter pick benefits local wildlife

Level 2 Animal Care students cleared up litter which was polluting the nearby River Weaver.

The students decided to help after learning about pollution incidents which caused the deaths of thousands of fish in the river. Twenty students collected four large bags of rubbish from the riverbank between Reaseheath College and Nantwich swimming baths.
